

Bright Beginnings Preschool Statement of Purpose

To provide a quality program in a Christian atmosphere where children have a happy, healthy wholesome learning experience that encompasses:

Physical Development-

By developing their large muscle skills through games at gym and playground time, and small muscle skills at manipulative centers during free play time.

Mental Development-

By developing their intellectual abilities at their own pace, critical thinking skills, creativity during art time, play time, and as we discuss lessons. They also develop an active curiosity about their community and God's creation on field trips. These areas all prepare each child for successful Kindergarten achievement.

Spiritual Development-

By providing a Christian education through prayer, songs, and Bible stories so they can develop their awareness of God, His Son Jesus Christ, and the Bible, and to make them meaningful and personal.

Social Development-

By developing friendships with other children and with their teachers. They learn ways to interact in a group setting and thus prepare the way for an enjoyable primary school experience. They also learn to express themselves in appropriate ways and appreciate the feelings of others.

Emotional Development-

By developing their confidence in group situations. They grow in their independence and become more comfortable with their environment. We seek to nurture in them. that each is unique and created and loved by God- and us!

Records

The school will keep records of attendance, academic assessments, and identification of each child. We have full details of where parents can be reached at work or at home including information about emergency contacts and authorized escorts.

Authorized Escorts

The school will dismiss a child ONLY to those people listed as authorized on the registration form. They will need to have photo identification with them, which a teacher will ask to see. Under no circumstance will a teacher make an allowance and let a child go with an unauthorized person, without permission from a parent or guardian.

Insurance

The school has liability insurance.

Emergency Services

Bright Beginnings Preschool staff will perform the necessary and proper actions to provide emergency health care to a student. This includes but is not limited to medical procedures by medical personnel as they deem necessary. A parent/guardian will always be attempted to be called and informed first. The parent/guardian is responsible for all costs and expense of such medical treatment.

Dismissal

The school reserves the right to dismiss a child, if after entering the preschool, the child seems unprepared for group experiences and is unable to adjust properly.

Health and Immunization Records

All children must have immunizations up to date, and parents will provide us with a record of these. Any exemption waivers must be signed by the child's physician.

Children must be left at home if ill and /or have the following symptoms: sore throat, fever of 99.6 or more, rash, earache, headache, or digestive upset. Children who develop signs of communicable diseases while at Preschool or develop a temperature will be isolated and a parent or emergency contact will be notified immediately. That person will be expected to come for the child as soon as possible.

The school will post any contagious diseases that have been reported to the class.

The staff at Bright Beginnings Preschool are trained in CPR and up to date with health standards.

School Closure due to Pandemic

We comply with the CDC and Washington State Department of Health guidelines and follow health and safety requirements to protect both the preschool teachers and students.

In the case of another closure such as we experienced with Covid-19, we will comply with what the CDC and Health Department require of us. We will hold Zoom classes and provide student packets and drive-by delivery to keep our students learning as best as we can.

Student Photo and Video on School Website and Facebook Page

Bright Beginnings Preschool periodically posts photos on our website, www.gbcpo.org, and on our Facebook page. Each parent can either consent or opt out at registration time. At no time will there be personal information shared along with a photo, such as a name, address, or location.

Registration and Tuition Fees

The fee for registering your child is payable in advance and is non-refundable.

Preschool tuition is payable in advance and is non-refundable. Payment is due on the first of the month, September through June. Payment is based on a yearly fee, divided into ten equal payments.

There are some months with less school days and some with more; the payment remains the same.

The fee will include a planned educational and developmental program. The school reserves the right to refuse service to those with unpaid fee accounts. There are no credits given for vacations and absences. In the event of natural emergencies or pandemics, no refunds will be given.

Late Child Pick-Up Fees

All children should be picked up immediately after class time. There is a late fee for the time you are late, noted in your tuition agreement. This is payable immediately to the teacher present at that time.

Withdrawals

30-day notice is required for a child intending to withdraw. If less is given, you will be charged the tuition amount to fulfill the 30-day notice requirement.

Holidays and Closures Holidays, winter and spring breaks please check the calendar on our website, www.gbcpo.org. We will also send home a physical copy home with your child.

When we find it necessary to close due to snow or inclement weather, we will post on our website, Facebook page- Bright Beginnings Preschool, you will also receive an email.

Ways Parents Can Help

Have your child attend regularly, unless ill. We have a progressive learning program that your child will benefit from if attendance is regular. Please call us if they are going to be absent.

Teach your child self-reliance by encouraging them to do things on their own. Help them by showing them how to take off and put on their coat themselves, set down their bucket, and enter the classroom each day.

Keep active communication with your child's teacher, but not in the presence of your child. Report any upsetting experiences which may help the teacher to better understand your child. Build a healthy, friendly attitude toward the teacher and take an interest in the classroom activities. Display their artwork at home. Always say goodbye to your child, then leave. Let them know who will pick them up.

Emergency Disaster Plan

The school has emergency supplies on site to last for 72 hours. This includes food staples, bottled water, first aid supplies, flashlights, and blankets. Children will be kept at school, attended by the teachers, until a parent or authorized escort can pick them up. Please keep your emergency numbers current. All teachers are certified in first aid and CPR.

Toys and Supplies

The school will provide all the necessary equipment. Children will not be permitted to bring personal property to school except on their Show and Tell day. The school or staff will not be responsible for any items brought to school.

Toileting Assistance

The Preschool staff will not be able to assist your children with toileting needs. If a toileting "accident" occurs, we will need to call you to bring a change of clothing and help your child. We will assist with clothing needs.

Discipline Policy

The Washington State policy, contained in WAC388-73-004- "Corporal Punishment" is prohibited. The teachers model and teach Christ's love for everyone. No child will be subjected to any form of sexual harassment, corporal punishment, pain, humiliation, ridicule, or threat.

Bright Beginnings' policy is a 5-step process:

- 1. The teacher speaks to the child, giving choices that are good for both the child and the group.
- 2. Redirecting- directing the child's activity away from the disruptive activity and helping him get involved in an acceptable activity.
- 3. Teacher places child in Time-out for a brief time, clearly stating why the child is there- keeping the child in sight. Taking a break is often all a child needs to regain control.
- 4. If a reoccurring behavior, teacher speaks to parent for assistance from home.
- 5. Director talks to parent; dismissal may be necessary if above steps do not yield positive results.

Teachers in every classroom state class rules often, in clear and appropriate language. They also indicate the consequence of not obeying the rules. Discipline is always fair and consistent. Most importantly, we initiate positive reinforcement. We make sure to praise the children for good and appropriate behavior.

Communication

Bright Beginnings Preschool will periodically post photos and videos on our website and Facebook pages. You may visit these sites to see what is happening in your child's classroom. Each teacher also sends home a monthly newsletter and calendar to inform parents of daily events and upcoming field trips.

Bright Beginnings teachers will complete a student assessment for each child at mid-year and a copy will be sent home. At any time, you are welcome to discuss your child's development with the teacher.

Free Play at Learning Centers

Housekeeping Area
